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- Non-adiabatic oscillations exist only in the solar atmosphere
- □ Neglect solar rotation ($\Omega/\omega \approx 10^{-4}$)
- Consider linear oscillations
- □ Linear equations in inertial reference frame
- Equation of continuity (*ξ* vectorial distance of a gas parcel from its equilibrium position)

$$\rho_1 + \nabla \cdot (\rho_0 \xi) = 0$$

□ Equation of the momentum

$$\rho_0 \frac{\partial^2 \boldsymbol{\xi}}{\partial t^2} + \nabla P_1 - \frac{\rho_1}{\rho_0} \nabla P_0 + \rho_0 \Phi_1 = 0$$

Relation between Lagrangian and Eulerian perturbation

$$\delta f = f_1 + \boldsymbol{\xi} \cdot \nabla f_0$$

Perturbation of the gravitational potential (Poisson's equation)

$$\Delta \Phi_1 = 4\pi G \rho$$

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Spherical Harmonic Representation

- □ The coefficients of the linear equations are known from the solar equilibrium model
- Vorticity of the perturbation has no vertical component

$$\boldsymbol{r} \cdot \nabla \times \frac{\partial^2 \boldsymbol{\xi}}{\partial t^2} = 0$$

□ In polar coordinates (with spherical harmonics)

$$\partial / \partial t \equiv i\omega \neq 0 \implies \frac{\partial}{\partial \theta} \left(\sin \theta \xi_{\phi} \right) - \frac{\partial \xi_{\theta}}{\partial \phi} = 0$$

$$\boldsymbol{\xi} = e^{i\omega t} \left(\boldsymbol{\xi}_r(r), \boldsymbol{\xi}_h(r) \frac{\partial}{\partial \theta}, \frac{\boldsymbol{\xi}_h(r)}{\sin \theta} \frac{\partial}{\partial \phi} \right) Y_l^m(\theta, \phi)$$

$$\left(\rho_{1},P_{1},\Phi_{1}\right)=e^{i\omega t}\left[\rho_{1}\left(r\right),P_{1}\left(r\right),\Phi_{1}\left(r\right)\right]Y_{l}^{m}\left(\theta,\phi\right)$$

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$$\frac{1}{r^{2}}\frac{d}{dr}\left(r^{2}\xi_{r}\right) - \frac{\xi_{r}g}{c^{2}} + \frac{1}{\rho_{0}}\left(\frac{1}{c^{2}} - \frac{l(l+1)}{r^{2}\omega^{2}}\right)P_{1} - \frac{l(l+1)}{r^{2}\omega^{2}}\Phi_{1} = 0$$

$$\frac{1}{\rho_{0}}\left(\frac{d}{dr} + \frac{g}{c^{2}}\right)P_{1} - \left(\omega^{2} - N^{2}\right)\xi_{r} + \frac{d\Phi_{1}}{dr} = 0$$

$$\frac{1}{r^{2}}\frac{d}{dr}\left(r^{2}\frac{d\Phi_{1}}{dr}\right) - \frac{l(l+1)}{r^{2}}\Phi_{1} - \frac{4\pi G\rho_{0}}{g}N^{2}\xi_{r} - \frac{4\pi G}{c^{2}P_{1}} = 0$$

$$\mathbf{Brunt-V\ddot{a}is\ddot{a}\ddot{a}\ddot{a} frequency$$

$$N^{2} = g\left(\frac{1}{\Gamma_{1}P_{0}}\frac{dP_{0}}{dr} - \frac{1}{\rho_{0}}\frac{d\rho_{0}}{dr}\right) \text{ with } g = -\frac{1}{\rho_{0}}\frac{dP_{0}}{dr}$$

$$\mathbf{Determine eigenfrequencies with non-trivial solutions for \omega$$

$$\mathbf{Since rotation was neglected, the eigenfrequencies are (2/+1)-fold degenerated$$

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
