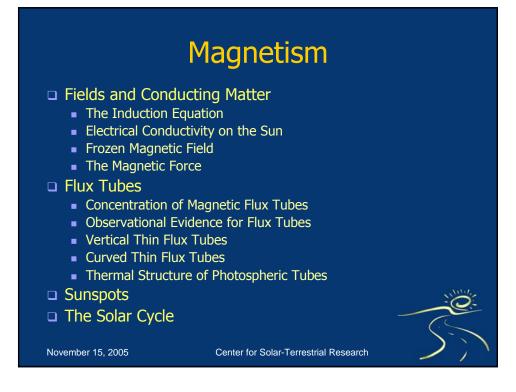

• Magnetic features: sunspots, sunspot fine structure, filaments, prominences, ...
• Magnetism on the Sun occurs on all scales! (small flux tubes to mean field)
• Maxwell's equations (magnetic permeability
$$\mu = 4\pi \times 10^{-7}$$
 Vs/Am)
 $\nabla \cdot \boldsymbol{B} = 0$
 $\nabla \times \boldsymbol{B} = \mu j$
 $\nabla \times \boldsymbol{E} = -\frac{d\boldsymbol{B}}{dt}$
• Ohm's law
 $\tilde{j} = \sigma \tilde{E} \text{ with } \tilde{j} = j \text{ and } \tilde{E} = \boldsymbol{E} + \boldsymbol{v} \times \boldsymbol{B}$
 $\Rightarrow j = \sigma (\boldsymbol{E} + \boldsymbol{v} \times \boldsymbol{B})$
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Induction equation
$$\frac{dB}{dt} = \nabla \times (\mathbf{v} \times \mathbf{B}) - \nabla \times (\eta \nabla \times \mathbf{B})$$
Magnetic diffusivity
$$\eta = \frac{1}{\mu \sigma}$$
Magnetic Reynolds number
$$R_m = \frac{\nu l}{\eta} = \frac{\tau_D}{\tau_A} \quad \text{with} \quad \tau_D = \frac{l^2}{\eta} \quad \text{and} \quad \tau_A = \frac{l}{\nu}$$
High conductivity:
$$R_m \gg 1 \quad \text{or} \quad \tau_D \gg \tau_A$$
Electrical conductivity of a fully ionized gas
$$\sigma = \frac{32\varepsilon_0^2 \sqrt{\pi} (2kT)^{3/2}}{\sqrt{m_e} e^2 Z \ln \Lambda} \gamma_E \quad \text{with} \quad \Lambda = \frac{r_D}{p_0}$$
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- □ In $\Lambda \approx 5$ for the solar interior, In $\Lambda \approx 10$ for the chromosphere, and In $\Lambda \approx 20$ for the corona
- Conductivity is large:

 $\sigma \simeq 0.003 \ T^{3/2} \ \text{A/Vm}$

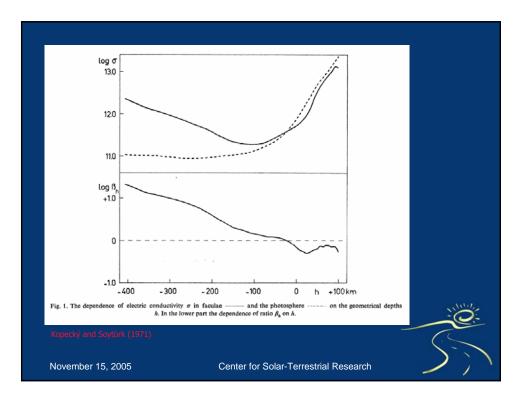
- □ The temperature in the solar photosphere/chromosphere is low ⇒ hydrogen and helium are neutral BUT heavier elements with low ionization potentials still donate electrons ⇒ collisions of electrons with neutrals ⇒ conductivity is greatly reduced
- Conductivity for weak ionization

$$\sigma = \frac{3e^2}{8S\left(2\pi m_{\rm e}kT\right)^{1/2}} \frac{n_{\rm e}}{n_{\rm n}}$$

- □ Large horizontal gradients (e.g., sunspots)
- \square Collisions are rare and magnetic fields are strong \Rightarrow anisotropy \searrow
- Plasma turbulence reduces conductivity

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$$\begin{aligned} & \text{Frozen Magnetic Fields} \\ \text{High conductivity } \sigma = 1 \text{ V/A (in sunspots), typical velocity} \\ \nu = 1 \text{ km/s, and scale height } / = 100 \text{ km } \Rightarrow \text{ frozen field lines} \\ \text{Total magnetic flux} \\ & \Phi = \int_{F} \mathbf{B} \cdot df \\ \text{observed } \mathbf{b} \\ \text{observed } \mathbf{b$$
