2 Scientific Rationale

2.1 Title

Chromospheric Fine-scale Structures in Sunspots and their associated Wave Properties

2.2 Abstract

We propose to observe fine-scale chromospheric oscillatory structures inside a sunspot with VIS and NIRIS instruments of the NST to study their associated wave properties. Motivated by the previous NST/FISS observations of propagating slow magnetoacoustic waves in a pore, and the NST/VIS detection of these chromospheric fine-scale oscillating structures, we aim to study the wave properties of chromospheric fine structures in detail. In specific, Dopper velocity pattern and the magnetic field geometry of the chromospheric fine structures will be investigated using high time cadence VIS observations along with NIRIS data. Those properties should be important to understand the wave phenomena of the fine structures, and has not been studied in detail yet.

2.3 Short Summary of the Request

We request 7 days of the telescope time under the fine observing conditions to observe sunspots with the VIS, BFI (TiO) and NIRIS. Since we are interested in wave properties, the most important component of these observations should be both the high spatial resolution and the time cadence. In order to increase the time cadence of the VIS, we will reduce the number of VIS wavelength points to 3 ($\pm 0.4, 0$ Å).

2.4 Scientific Rationale

Due to the interaction between photospheric oscillations and the complex magnetic structure of a sunspot, various dynamical phenomena such as waves or shocks are observed with a diverse range of scales in sunspot umbra. High-resolution imaging spectrometer, such as VIS/NST, provides a good chance of both resolving fine-scale oscillating structures and investigating their wave properties. Besides the fact that such a fine-scale structure itself has not been well studied before, the relationship between its oscillatory motion and other sunspot waves is not well understood. By utilizing the high spatial resolution of the VIS with increased time cadence, we expect to study the wave properties of chromospheric fine-scale structures, such as the spatial distribution of the wave source, relationship with the running penumbral wave, and the effect of the magnetic field distribution on the wave properties.

2.5 Results from Previous NST Observations

Previous FISS/NST observations detected oscillation in the pore atmosphere, and recently it has been verified that such oscillation is actually a slow magnetoacoustic wave propagating along the pore magnetic field. Although the study showed that the detected wave source is not single but multiple, the spatial resolution of the FISS image was not high enough to check the fine structures or spatial distribution of the wave source in the pore. Recently published high resolution VIS observations detected fine-scale chromospheric structures inside a sunspot umbra oscillating along the strong sunspot magnetic field. The study suggested that they are wave phenomena and related with the onset of running penumbral waves.

2.7 Expected Results

We expect to understand the wave properties of chromospheric oscillating fine structures, and also their relationship with other previously known sunspot waves.

3 Observing Programme

3.1 Instrumentation Requirements*

3.2 Observational Strategy

The most important component of this observation is to obtain VIS data with high time cadence of 10 seconds. In order for that, we will reduce VIS wavelength points to $3 : 0.0, \pm 0.4$ Å. For

the BFI and NIRIS, standard observing mode is sufficient. The preferred time cadence of the NIRIS is 1 minute.

3.3 Target and Conditions

The aimed target is a number of sunspots and pores not effected by any abrupt flaring events. Sunspots that are slightly tilted are preferred.
